Terrible Two 2003 Results

Finally: a Terrible Two that is truly terrible

Mark down June 28, 2003 as the day the Terrible Two returned to its roots. The traditional triple whammy of this hardest of all double centuries has always been miles (200), hills (over 16,000'), and heat (100?+). But for the past ten years, the heat has been missing...a non-factor. Year after year, the day of the event has dodged the bullet: it has been hot on Friday or Sunday, but never on Saturday. It got so bad (or so good), we had to strike the "100°" line off the back of the TT t-shirts. An entire generation of Terrible Two participants had never experienced the ride in all its sick, infamous glory...until now.

All that changed this year, as riders saut'ed themselves on the sizzling griddle of Skaggs Springs after lunch. On-bike thermometers were reading as high as 118° over that entire section, and the roadside was littered with stationary, glassy-eyed riders...either done for the day or husbanding their depleted stores of energy against one more hot climb, and then one more after that. It was nearly as hot on the exposed sections of the Geysers before lunch too, with triple digit readings common. As bad as it was though, it could have been a lot worse! The official high on the day for Cloverdale - which is what we use as our annual benchmark - was 'only' 98°. It had been well over 100° on Thursday and Friday preceding the ride. And if 98° in Cloverdale translated to 118° on Skaggs, think what it must have been like in our last hot years '92 and '93 - when the official highs were 106° and 108° respectively. In fact, some TT vets, who remember those nasty old rides, claim this edition was "not that bad" in comparison. And for those who survived the gauntlet on Skaggs, it was cool - even nearly cold - on the foggy coast. Such are the extremes of Sonoma County's microclimates.

Ancient history aside, this ride was hot enough for anyone, and too hot for many. A comparison to last year's mild weather and fast times is instructive. Last year, when the mercury never climbed out of the 80°s, 80% of the starting field finished by 10:00 pm. This year only 64% made it in time to claim their "I Did It!" t-shirts. Last year, if you had finished in 14 hours, you would have been in 77th place. This year, 14 hours would have been good for 45th. Generally speaking, the blistering weather added an average of an hour to most riders' times, depending on how well they coped with the heat.

2002's big dog Brian Anderson of Santa Rosa backed up his record-setting time from last year (10:50) with another first place finish, this time in a more sedate 11:13. He finished with Jeff Landauer, who was leading the California Triple Crown Stage Race going into the TT. Rohnert Park's Robert Choi was right behind Jeff in the Stage Race standings, and that's exactly where he stayed: he finished 17 minutes behind Jeff on the TT, so Laudauer wrapped up the Stage Race and Choi finished second.

Pat Ross of Richmond was the first woman finisher at 12:38 (good for 15th overall). That's not counting last year's winner Catharina Berge, who this year finished in 11:42 (tied for 6th overall), but did it on the back seat of Paul McKenzie's tandem, breaking the record for a co-ed tandem. The former record of 12:21 had been set by Paul, with pro racer Sara Ballantyne as stoker. The new co-ed record is in fact the record for all tandems, eclipsing the men's tandem record by 10 minutes. Pretty impressive, considering the harsh conditions. One other record was set on this day as well: Sunnyvale's James Kern set a new recumbent record of 13:53 for the 200-mile course, bettering Bruce DeBell's mark of 14:29. The 'bent crowd still has a way to go though to beat Eric House's time of 12:53, set on the old 211-mile course. Also deserving a special mention was Derek Kuda of Faifield, who completed the ride in 16:26 on a single-speed mountain bike. Not a fixed-gear, but nevertheless, an amazing accomplishment on such a hilly circuit.

Overall, there were 242 official starters...not a record but right up there with our other biggest fields of 252 in 2001 and 245 in 2000. Of those, 177 completed the course, 156 by the traditional cut-off of 10:00 pm. There was only one significant accident, and it was a rather flukey one: a tired rider fumbling with a package of Tums toppled over on the slow climb on Black Mountain and broke his hip. As far as we know, there were no accidents caused by sketchy pack riding or by overzealous descending on the usual, suspect slopes. This may be an all-time low for serious accidents.

Many riders at the finish lavished praise on the support personnel who helped them get the job done under very trying conditions. We heard repeated hosannahs for the cold towels at the Skaggs Springs water stop...real lifesavers for many suffering souls. Sag drivers, rest stop crews, dinner crews, and even the radio staff...all came in for their share of thanks from the grateful but weary road warriors. We like to think the Terrible Two is not only the hardest double, but also the best supported. That may seem oxymoronic at first glance, but isn't really. The event is hard because of the inherent challenge of the landscape: the miles, the steep climbs, and- sometimes- the brutal heat. It shouldn't be hard because our crew ran out of food or supplements or water. So hats off to both the riders who finished this grueling marathon, and to the volunteers who helped them do it.
