Terrible Two, 1997: a nice day for a bike ride...

Last year, after finishing an impressive 2nd in his first Terrible Two, local boy and SRCC member Dan Hopley declared, "I'm never doing this ride again!" He was almost as good as his word, holding out until nearly the final day of registration before losing his resolve and sending in his entry. If Dan had mixed feelings about doing this daunting double again, he appeared to have them sorted out before ride time: he was first over the Geysers and came into lunch in a lead pack of seven. After dawdling a bit at the lunch stop, he caught and passed all the other leaders on the first big climbs on Skaggs Springs and motored away from everyone. Behind him, four riders began working together to reel him in, but even battling into a choppy headwind on the coast, all by himself, he still managed to put time on them and cruised home with a 17-minute lead. His time of 11:34 wasn't a record, but his margin of victory was the widest in several years, and his pursuers were no slouches: Rob Ifflander (last year's winner), Daryn Dodge (winner of several other doubles), Dave Discher, and Ray Plumhoff. (Note: Dodge and Plumhoff would both finish first on subsequent TTs and would both break the course record when they did so.)

Ray was on a single this year after stoking on last year's record-setting tandem with Paul McKenzie. Paul was back this year, aiming for the co-ed tandem record with mountain biking legend Sara Ballantyne as the backseat driver. This record attempt was successful as well, as their 12:21 (good for 11th overall) took nearly an hour off last year's record set by Mark Patten and Cindi Staiger. Further back in the field, Liz Galler and Kathlynn Beranek were setting another tandem record as the first all-gal big bike to complete the ride. Rita Faglia (nee Bozzo) topped the largest women's field ever for her third win in three tries, with a time of 13:46.

Not only was it the largest women's field ever, it was the largest field ever for the event, with nearly 220 riders spinning off into the sunrise in the traditional 5:30 AM mass start. 174 riders completed the course, 156 of them by the dreaded 10:00 PM "I Did It!" cut-off time. That appears to be about the standard for the new, shorter course.

High heat—the Terrible two's legendary bogeyman—was once again missing. The weather was cool and breezy most of the day and even a little chilly and damp out on the cliffs above the ocean, with the fog collecting in the trees and dripping on the road like a light rain. Many people complained about the unusual headwind on the run down Hwy 1, but few mentioned the corresponding tailwind on the run up Silverado Trail and Hwy 128 earlier in the day. It was just hot enough down in the protected canyons on the Geysers and Skaggs to make folks feel like they were really suffering. For the fourth year in a row, we just dodged the bullet on the heat: in each of those years, a mild TT Saturday has been followed by triple-digit readings a week later. Once again this year, by the following weekend, the mercury was hovering aound 100° in Cloverdale. Next year, the ride is scheduled one week later...

While the generally benign weather made the ride a little easier than it might have been, it was still extremely tough. Several after-ride discussions turned to the question of which was harder this year: the TT or the new Devil Mountain Double. The consensus seemed to be that while DMD took longer to complete, this ride beats you up more. Why this is so in not quite clear, but most riders agree that in spite of being tougher, the TT is also their favorite ride. (Ask them that question as they're wandering through the purgatory of Skaggs Springs or winching themselves wearily up Fort Ross Road and they may give you a decidely different and probably unprintable reply, but after the ride, while basking in the glow of their accomplishment, most of them are cheerfully generous in their praise of the event.)

Another unique aspect of the Terrible Two was mentioned by one of the front runners: the impressive caliber of riders in the field. Whether it's because of the great scenic beauty around the course or the challenging terrain or just its gnarly reputation, this ride always attracts a large number of excellent riders from other cycling disciplines who aren't regulars on the ultra/doubles scene. This year's field included riders who've won

major USCF races, world-class mountain bike events, and Ironman-distance triathlons...as well as a few very strong North Bay homeboys who never enter anything else but show up year after year for this, their favorite backyard ride. Hopley is a perfect case in point: a former NCNCA district road race champion who has only three doubles in his resumé...two TTs and a Davis (during which event he was photographed, with the image ending up on the cover of *Bicycling* magazine).

Our annual True Grit-No Brains award will be shared this year by two equally deserving riders. Ronald Milla ran afoul of a bad bump on the notorious Fort Ross descent and hit the deck, ending up with a clavicle broken in three places. As this was the third leg of his Triple Crown season, he was not about to quit and soldiered in the final 30, very painful miles. Earlier in the day, way back on the top of Trinity Grade, Duane Stephens stopped to clear a chip of wood out of his Speedplay cleat. Using a Swiss Army knife, he somehow managed to badly slice through the middle finger of his right hand, severing the extensor tendon, so the finger was flopping loose like a trap door. (He's a right-handed heart surgeon.) Our on-the-spot paramedic dressed the wound and then we redid the dressing at lunch and he carried on...170 miles with a finger hanging half-off. What some people will do for a t-shirt!

An honorable mention in this category might go to SRCC member John Eberly. He had crashed in the district criterium championships on the preceding Saturday, sustaining numerous minor injuries. Then he crashed again in a local crit on Tuesday evening, severely dislocating his shoulder. But the siren song of the Terrible Two was calling, and so, four days later, he set of to ride 200 miles of bumpy backroads, with an arm that should have been resting at home in a sling. 175 miles of painful pounding later, he had to cry uncle near Cazadero. A day later, the shoulder was swollen to twice its normal size. (Isn't this fun?)

Other local club members fared a little better: over 20 SRCCers started the ride and I believe at least 17 finished before 10, with Bert Daniel, Chuck Tyler, Robert Rand, Chris Murray, and Craig Combs all completing it for the first time. Congratulations to all of them and to all the other riders who came from near and far to tackle this toughest of all doubles. How far did riders come to do this ride? We had entrants from Washington, DC, Kentucky, Ohio, Missouri, Idaho, Arizona, Oregon, Utah, Washington, and Nevada, and of course from every corner of California. Will any of them return next year? If you asked them immediately after the ride, most would say no. But as we learned with Dan Hopley, you need to take that first response with a large grain of salt.
