## A user-friendly Terrible Two for 2018

That "user-friendly" header may seem like a sick joke to some of the participants in the Terrible Two on June 16. No Terrible Two is easy or friendly. But it's meant as a relative term: compared to some of the nastier editions of the event, this one was fairly benign. Most significantly, the weather was nice. Official temperatures for Saturday around the course ranged from below 60° on the coast to above 80° in Cloverdale, the mid-point of the long ride. If there was anything to complain about, it might be that it was a little too chilly after twilight. A fair bit of shivering was seen among the riders at the finish, once their engines started to cool down after their big efforts.

There were 150 registered riders. Minus a few no-shows, 139 were waved off at 5:30 AM for their long day. 60 more started the 200-K at 7:30 for almost 200 riders on the course. When all the clapping and cow bells finally tapered off at the finish, 109 of the doubles riders had completed the course (plus one e-bike rider who doesn't count in the standings). 73 made it in by our traditional cutoff of 10:00 PM to earn the right to an "I DID IT!" t-shirt. That's just under 53%, which is not all that high. However, 109 finishers out of 138 (again, not counting the e-bike) adds up to a 79% finishing rate...much more consistent with the relatively pleasant conditions.

The fact that so many people—36—finished after 10:00 suggests that while the overall challenge was not all that terrible, it did take a bit longer than normal. This is only speculation, but we wonder if the detour in the early miles rode a little slower than our traditional route. (Napa County officials forced us to go over Calistoga-St Helena-Spring Mountain instead of Trinity-Dry Creek-Oakville.) The course was a mile and a half longer with approximately the same elevation gain. Perhaps something about this detour didn't lend itself to the same tempo. We began to wonder when the leaders didn't arrive at the first check point in Calistoga until about 8:30. That's at least ten minutes slower than a typical TT. (It's becoming increasingly difficult to talk about a "typical" TT after three years in a row of altered courses.) The slower tempo at the front of the field translated to even larger variation back through the pack.

The same slow pace was still in evidence at lunch, where our homeboy Jady Palko arrived first at 11:41, five minutes ahead of the next rider but almost 18 minutes behind when we expect to see the first riders. Rich Thurman, Caleb Carl, and Steve Smead all arrived by 11:49. The four stayed near one another—more or less—all the way to the Fort Ross rest stop. Then Carl, a 29-year old from Colorado, finally pulled away. His finish time was 12:02, with Thurman 15 minutes back and Palko two minutes behind him. 12:02 is an excellent time. More speculation, but maybe the cooler temps through midday allowed at least the stronger riders to recoup some of the time lost on the early detour?

First woman in was Corinne Warren (14:13, 24th overall). Warren is also from Colorado so we had a Rocky Mountain sweep this year. Second woman in was Tara Kurihara of Oakland at 14:40, still quick enough to make the top 30.

Of the 60 riders who started the 200-K, 54 finished. Shawn Daly of Santa Rosa was the first one in with a time of 7:28. He was the first finisher in 2016 as well. Last year's first finisher, Joe Hughes of Sebastopol, tied for second this year at 7:30, along with James Drake and Alex Trevena. Jennie Philips was once again the fastest woman, with a time of 8:04, good for 6th place. She has now finished first in all three of the TT 200-Ks since we started having mass starts and timing. One other finisher of note: Nicole Steinmetz...at age 15, the youngest to ever finish our 200-K. (What were you doing at 15? Probably not one of the hardest 200-Ks around.)

Overall it was a pretty good day, at least for the eight out of ten riders (in the double) and nine out of ten (in the 200-K) who managed to roll across the finish line at Analy High School. We did have two crashes that sent riders to the hospital. A 200-K rider lost it on the treacherous descent from the

Rancheria and ended up with a broken collarbone and three fractured ribs, while a woman ran afoul of one of the gravel traps on the backside of the Geysers in the full double and fractured something in her left shoulder. They promise to return.

Perhaps the biggest story of this year's Terrible Two is that it happened at all. After our club warehouse and everything in it was lost in the fires last October, there were many who doubted whether the club could recover. Canceling this event was considered. But eventually we got back up off the floor and pulled ourselves together. Thanks to an amazing amount of can-do spirit from the members and some really huge and heart-warming contributions from other bike clubs and local organizations, we are back! We put on a successful Wine Country Century in May and now another fine TT in June.

That same can-do energy was apparent all around the course during the ride and behind the scenes in the days and weeks before and after the event. Hundreds of club volunteers pitching in, early and often. The longest any rider was out there on Saturday was just over 17 and a half hours, but there were workers—many of them—who logged over 20 hours that day and pulled shifts on Friday and Sunday as well. They are a large part of why this event was so user-friendly. Thanks to all our volunteers and to all the riders who added this day to their 2018 to-do list. We hope to see you all back in 2019.
